





# PROFILES: EMMETT and BETTIE CARPENTER - HAMILTON'S BICYCLES EAST - Wichita, Kan. Page 3

Back in the year 1910, in Wichita, Kansas, Cecil B.T. Hamilton opened up a bike shop that was destined to become one of the outstanding custom cycle shops in the country. Prior to ettling in Wichita he had taken up the bike business in the year 1895 in Columbus, Ohio. 'Hammy" as he was affectionately called, built many cycles for handicapped people and many special cycles for circus use. Whenever a circus played the area he would visit the performers and ask them what repairs they needed or what special cycles they would like to have constructed. His shop also sponsored bicycle racers and from 1925 to 1935 one of his outstanding riders was EMMETT CARPENTER who in 1932 wound up as the Kansas State Champion. Emmett went on to college, became interested in cars, and obtained a degree in engineering with an engine design option. He worked for Chrysler as an engine designer, with Beach Aircraft Co. on the design of an electric car, and finally with Boeing Aircraft Co. designing test equipment. Emmett also married Hammy's daughter BETTIE and they maintained contact with the bike shop in Wichita. In 1954 Hammy sold the business to Emmett and Bettie but continued to work in the shop himself until his death in 1966 at age 86. Until 1970 Emmett continued to work at Boeing while Bettie ran the store. In 1970 Emmett took over and put his 25 years experience as a design engineer to work in the cycle shop. He redesigned their standard unicycle so it would have sealed bearings and for awhile built his own saddles until upholstery costs went up so much and the less expensive Messinger saddle came along. In addition to regular unicycles many chain driven giraffes were built b his shop and some of these have been seen all over the country in the performances of the MELVIN ROLER family of Greenville, Indiana. The Rolers are a family group of cyclists who have performed coast to coast in such events as the Cotton Bowl Parade etc.

The Carpenters, Emmett and Bettie maintained the good will and name of Hamilton's Bicycles East and when it came to custom built cycles became known for their originality and fine craftsmanship. In addition to unicycles Hamilton's also built a 7' bicycle for the circus act KLAUSER'S BEARS (Now HERTA'S) and a number of 8 man tandem bicycles that allowed all 8 riders to pedal. The first two of these mammoth tandems were built for the Shriners. The irst for the Shrine at Coeur D'Alene in Idaho in 1956 and the second for the Shrine in Rock Springs, Wyoming in 1971. These were both 23 ft long, weighed 500 lbs, and took a 105' circle to turn.

Hamilton's shop foreman DAN DAFRON is also a former State Champion and first started to work for Hammy in the early 20's. His experience later as a tool and die maker in an aircraft factory was of particular value when he returned to the bike shop. He now builds all the unicycles and special bikes.

Of only 2 or 3 custom cycle shops in the entire nation Hamilton's is now probably the largest and they average 50 to 60 custom cycles a year. About a third of these are for professional entertainers. Over the past 5 years the demand has increased greatly for custom cycles and many of Hamilton's creations have been for aspiring young amateurs who want something they cannot buy over the counter. Some of the performing groups and customers Hamilton's has built cycles for, in addition to the Rolers of Indiana are: THE GREAT Y CIR-CUS of Redlands, California, BOUNCE AND CY of The Loco-Motion Circus, Amherst, Massachusetts, MIKE HOL-U-BAR of Baton Rouge, La., PATRICIA SHARON SOUTH of Bordentown, N.J., EUGENE BAIMAIN of Las Vegas, and THE DETROIT ZOO (for chimps)

Each new custom cycle is a challenge and after Emmett completes the design his long time assistant Dan Daffron, age 72, welds them together and puts on the finishing touches. For a custom cycle shop with a personal touch, that is a boon to unicyclists who want something special, we salute Hamilton's Bicycles East, 1622 S. Parkwood Lane, Wichita Kansas 67218 and their outstanding staff EMMETT & BETTIE CARPENTER and DAN DAFFRON.

The GREAT Y CIRCUS, some of whose cycles appear in photos in connection with the above story, cently completed nine performances at San Bernadino Central City Mall in Calif. March 11-13 and played to audiences of 800-1000 each performance. Aside from unicycles their act included Artistic Bicycling, Teeterboard, Juggling, Handbalancing, Rola Bola, and Trampoline. Local news media gave excellent reviews and a return engagement is planned for the fall.

This because of insurance problems. The State of Wisconsin, under which the Circus World Museum operates, changed their insurance plan and no insurance company could be found that will write a policy for the Acrobatic School. This is despite the fact that in their four years existance there had not been a single accident. What a shame - and what a loss to aspiring young circus performers.

The Circus World Museum will continue to present its Bir Top Show with professional performers however from Mid May to Mid September and if you have never visited Baraboo (where Ringling Bros. Circus winterquartered for some 3h years during the hey-dey of the outdoor circus) you should try to work it into your vacation schedule.

# DATES TO REMEMBER - PERFORMERS



# MISC. NEWS: From the news media

THE NEW YORK TIMES of Sunday, March 13, 1977 carried two pages of pictures and an article on the European Style Circus playing at ONSTAGE in Freeport, Long Island. ONSTAGE has some 111 performances of the Circus scheduled up to April 17th and has been displaying some top talent. Your ed. finally got to take in an afternoon performance one weekend in March and was so impressed that he and Mrs. Jenack stayed for the evening performance. Between times he had a chance to talk with performers and explore the fabulous big building. Years ago it was a famous vaudeville theater that later turned into a movie house. About three years ago Arnold Carlson, a Long Island Businessman and circus fanatic bought the Freeport theater and hit upon the idea of turning it into a disco-cabaret-theater and feature circus acts a-la European one ring style. This he did and is featuring circus acts gathered from all over the world. In addition some local talent is appearing including John Jenack who goes under the name JeanPaul. In connection with this a humorous incident involving newspaper reporters occurred one evening and your ed. would like to share it with you. The eloquent ringmaster in his booming voice introduces John's act each time by saying something Vincent Gaeta like: "And now ladies and gentlemen the gregarious young Lord-Of-The-Wheel JeanPaul" After the show that evening the reporters gathered about and were talking to John and calling him GREG. John corrected them and said his name was JeanPaul. They immediately replied that they distinctly heard the ringmaster introduce him as GREGARIOUS YOUNG. Another humorous incident that occurred the day your ed. attended was when John whispered to his father "Did you see that baboon ride the giraffe unicycle ? - he can ride smoother than I". He was referring to Mel Hall's baboon act in which one of Mel's baboons actually does ride a giraffe unicycle about 8' tall - and with little effort. Mel Hall by the way is one of the most famous of the all time greats in unicycling. He no longer performs himself but, as he says, lets the baboons do all the hard work and he collects the pay. Your ed. had the opportunity to meet Mel's beautiful and charming daughter Min1 who was also on the program that evening with the Castle Bears Act. Nini has the distinction of being probably the youngest person ever to learn to ride a unicycle. When she was only 18 months, and in diapers, Mel had her riding around the stage on a tiny unicycle. In a future issue your ed. hopes to bring you nore about Mel Hall and his unicycling.

THE DAILY WORLD of Aberdeen, Washington, Sun. Feb. 13, 1977 carried a full page article on STEVE and JOHN MCPEAK titled: "A New High For Hoquiam Men". Steve and John, two of our members, graduated from Hoquiam High School in 1964 about the same time they started their unicycling, juggling, and highwire walking. The Daily World article carried the photo of Steve setting a new world record riding his 41' unicycle on highwire and a photo of John Juggling at Circus Circus in Las Vegas where, on the same date, Oct. 28, 1976, he set a new world's juggling endurance record by juggling for 6 hrs and 45 minutes. Both Steve and John came to visit your ed. shortly thereafter and then each took off in a different direction. Steve flew to Rio deJaneiro where, with CBS producer LARRY LINDBERG, he set up the CBS SPORTS SPECTACULAR seen on TV on March 18th in which Steve walked the 1300 ft high tramway cable 2700 ft to SUGARLOAF PEAK over the Rio Skyline. John took off for Amsterdam on a juggling tour of Europe. At present he is performing at the Friedrichstadtpalast in East Berlin and is receiving tremendous ovations for his spectacular juggling act. Congratulations to BETTY BUTLER of The Daily World for her great write-up on these two outstanding members.

THE NEW YORKER Magazine, January 10, 1977 carried a full page cartoon (p.24) that must have tickled unicyclists who ran across it in the course of their reading. The cartoon portrays a big game hunter reading by the fireplace in his den. Hanging on the walls, and satisfying his ego, are the stuffed heads of various big game which he has, with his prowess, overcome. Hanging there with the mounted heads, in what almost appears out of place at first, is another trophy of perhaps an even greater challenge he has met and conquered - A GIRAFFE UNICYCLE.

Another humorous cartoon in this month's Saturday Evening Post depicts a Sunday Drive-in church service and ushers on unicycles riding out among the cars taking up the collection. WALLY WATTS expects to return soon to Greece and continue his round the world unicycle ride



# LOOKING FOR SOMETHING NEW TO TRY ON YOUR UNICYCLE?

Here are a few of JIM DANDY'S (Jess Conefeldt) favorites that he is still doing on the west coast at age 70. Our January 1976 newsletter carried a feature story, and additional photos of other amazing cycle feats this "Legend In His Own Time" Unicyclist has been doing to amaze spectators for over half a century.

# JESS MONEFELDT (Cont.)

After reading the feature write-up in the January 1976 newsletter a number of readers have written to ask: "Is it really true that Jim Dandy can ride his unicycle and balance a ball point per or dollar bill on his nose at the same time?" Your editor must confess that when he first heard about this feat he thought it must be a rubber cement trick of some sort. However just a year ago while visiting in California he had the good fortune to spend some time with Jim Dandy and to see him actually perform these tricks (and with no gimmicks). In hopes that some of our members would like to become adept at a few of these super feats, and with Jim Dandy's kind permission, the photos of him in action are printed on page 9. These photos in the order numbered are of him:

- 1. Balancing a dollar bill on nose while riding unicycle
- 2. Spinning eight rings in various directions on arms and legs while balancing four others on mouthstick and rocking one foot
- 3. Balancing ball point pen on nose while on unicycle
- 4. Balancing glass of punch on top of one stick balanced on another and also riding uni
- 5. Balancing 12 trays filled with 44 glasses and a vase of flowers one hand while riding

In connection with the above no gimmicks are employed and the only thing that comes close to such is that in number 4 the top of the stick upon which the glass is balanced has a 1" washer attached. For learning the ball point pen balance Jim suggests beginners start with a 3 foot dowel and keep making it shorter as skill develops. He says to learn to balance things the fastest way start with the 3 ft dowel and balance it first on the chin (which is easiest). Then when one has that perfect move it up to the nose - and when the nose balance is learned move it to forehead. The nose balance is best suited for the pen and all very short items. Tips of this nature are greatly appreciated by beginners and we wish to thank Jim Dandy for sharing this one with us.

Although now 70 years of age Jim Dandy is still performing regularly and one of the great shows he appeared in recently was the BING CROSBY FAMILY CHRISTMAS SHOW, Dec. 21, 1976. He writes that he enjoyed every minute of it and that Bing, his wife, and their two sons are one beautiful family. To Jim Dandy (Jess Monefeldt) and his charming wife Gertrud we wish continued good health and happiness for many years to come.



If you attended or Watched the INAUGURAL PARADE on TV Jan. 20 you no doubt noticed the unicyclists taking part. They were the ST. HELEN'S UNICYCLE DRILL TEAM of Newbury, Ohio. Although St. Helen's Drill Team has performed in events all over USA including the ORANGE BOWL this past year, where they took top honors, this was the first inaugural parade for most of them and riding down Pennsylvania Ave. was a real thrill. They were applauded along the entire parade route but their biggest thrill came when both PRESIDENT CARTER AND VICE PRESIDENT MONDALE gave them a standing applause. Some of the 45 cyclists who took part in this parade and their outstanding specialties are:

In the races, if you get off or falloff you will be disqualified with the exception of the relay, half mile and mile race, but if you run with the unicycle you will also be disqualified. Races will start at 9:00 a.m. sharp, August 20 at Southland Mall.

The Meet will resume at the Marion Catholic High School for the Obstacle Course. The first and second place winners in each group (girls and boys) will be chosen and given an award on Saturday night. The first place girl and the first place boy will demonstrate their abilities on August 21 at the Coliseum.

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Preliminaries for individual trick riding and lunch time will be from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. The time limit for individual trick riding is 3 minutes. The 3 runners up in each category in the individual trick riding competition will be chosen August 20. They will then complete August 21 for the girls and boys first and second places at the Coliseum. The Dept. of Recreation of Marion will time the races.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

Races will be run in accordance with standard high school track rules with the exceptions stated below: Registration fee is \$1.00. The day of the races the fee is \$1.50 so get your registration form in early to Paul Fox, 983 East Center Street, Marion, Ohio 43302.

- All races will be started with rider mounted, holding to support, except 2nd, 3rd and 4th relay riders who will have a starting distance to receive the baton.
- Any rider fouling shall be disqualified for that race.
- Any rider intentionally fouling shall be disqualified and barred from further competition.
- Rider must ride across finish line.
- A standard unicycle must be used at the races, 5 -1/2 crank arm or longer.
- If rider falls or dismounts, he is disqualified except in relay, 880 yard or mile races where he shall remount without running.
- Rider may not compete on both 20 inch and 24 inch wheels in any one race of the same distance.
- All riders must be registered at least 15 minutes before race.
- All riders must stay in their lane. However, if rider gets out of lane and immediately gets back without interfering with other riders he will not be disqualified.
- In the "obstacle course" each rider shall be allowed two (2) rides with the best time being
  official. Pylons may be hit but not knocked over. If pylons are knocked over, the rider
  will be disgualified in that race.
- Rider may compete in <u>one</u> one mile race only.
- No club may have more than two teams in girls or boys relay races.
- Any changes in rules and regulations must be in by April Newsletter.

### SLEEPING FACILITIES

Sleeping facilities will be available Friday and Saturday nights, August 19 and 20, at Marion Catholic High School. Showers and restrooms will be at your disposal. There will be a \$1.00 fee for each night and also a 50¢ charge for the use of showers. Bring your own sleeping necessities. Name tags on all personal items, please. You must chaperon your own group five kids for one adult is a must. Disorderly conduct by those using the sleeping quarters at the high school will lead to disqualification at the Meet. The Holiday Inn is taking reservations.





### KING AND QUEEN





# CONSTRUCTION:






One of our members GARY LIGHTNER of 99 Tower St. Sayville, N.Y. 11796 has a hobby of designing all types of vehicles, buildings, and anything functional. With his recent mastery of a 6' giraffe he has turned to sketching up novel unicycles and recently sent your ed. a whole batch of novel ideas. One that particularly caught your ed's attention was his Pogo Cycle - sketch appears at left. If joint tolerances are kept close to avoid sloppiness about the vertical axis this cycle might work and could be quite a humorous eyecatcher with a clown on top. When MARK DOUGLAS of The Uniques rode his Zig-Zag giraffe at one of the National Neets your Ed. and Dr. ORLAND RIYNOLDS discussed the possibility of adding movable joints and a hydraulic cylinder to achieve an adjustable height control. Sure would be funny to see a clown, while in motion, lover his giraffe to enable him to ride thru an exit door or something of that sort. Should any of you unicycle builders make up such a cycle please let us know about it. ED's note: If you wonder how people like Gary can figure out things like this perhaps the answer is an environmental one - you see Gary works for the Internal Revenue Service and for someone who can figure out those IRS forms at this time of year simple things like unicycle design come easy.

A Do-It-Yourself project appears at the right. Get yourself a large washer and some pieces of metal, or some cardboard, and make one of these clever jumping-jack type cyclists which you can pose in any position you wish.

We are indebted to GORAN LUNDSTROM of Sweden for this clever project. It was taken from magazine DESIGN ART DIRECTION '75 and the uni-man was designed by ALAN FLETCHER





TOM MILLER our prolific builder of big wheel unicycles completed five of them recently for members of the KOKOMO ROAD RUNNERS of which he is the leader. Pictured above are five of them riding their big wheels which range in size from 39" to 45" in diameter. Left to Rt. in phote "o. 1 Greg McElwain, Ted Wade, Tom Miller, Steve Black, and Jeff Sexton. At the right in photo No. 2 stands Tom with two of his creations. The cycle on right is his 452" big wheel which is the largest he has built to date. On the left is his 39" wheel which is a first, as far as your editor knows, in that it has a pneumatic tire. Tom took two regular cycle tires, cut the wired edge and refitted them to make a single large tire by silver soldering the wired edges and smoothing the skived joint with a rubber compound. The small phot No. 3 shows what a neat job he did on the joint. You can see where he made the splice but it is smooth and neat and according to Tom rides like a dream. For an inner tube he simply cut and cemented two regular tubes together with rubber cement telescoping one inside the other to achieve the correct size. Tom has just enlisted in the Air Force but after basic expects to be able to pursue his hobby while in the service and will be building more big wheel and novel cycles. He even hopes to be able to supply others with special parts and in our July issue perhaps we can give interested readers more on that. Tom just built your ed. a fork for his 44" rubber tired buggy wheel and it is a work of art. Our best wishes to Tom on his chosen career in the Air Force and we will be looking forward to additional news on his big wheel construction projects.

# FROM YOUR EDITOR:

The 1977 annual meeting of the U-S-A Inc. will be held in Marion, Ohio on Sun. Aug. 21 from 9:30AM to Noon. Exact location will be announced in July - probably L-K Restaurant or Holiday Inn Motel. By scheduling the meeting Sun. AM rather than at end of meet it is hoped a larger/ attendance will result. Your ed. and the officers of the U-S-A Inc. would like to request the members give some thought to this meeting ahead of time as there are some very important items on the agenda. Among these are: The Election of Officers for 1978, The selection of a new Newsletter Editor, and the selection of the host for and tentative date of a National Meet or Convention in 1978. In regard to the last two of these your ed. would like to offer some information and suggestions. The first is in connection with a new Newsletter Editor (Your present ed. feels he will be unable to handle the job after Dec. 31st) - In a letter recently mailed to members who attended the March meeting in Marion and others who have taken an active part in the organization your ed. suggested that the new editor be made responsible for just the pasteup of the newsletter each quarter and that the actual printing, mailing, and the handling of orders for books, back issues, and other items be taken care of by the Sec'y Treasurer. In the past the lag that occurred between membership applications being received by the sec'y and transmitted to the newsletter editor has resulted in a continual state of confusion as to who was paid up and until when. Having the Sec'y Treas. handle this directly would eliminate the middleman and streamline the whole bookkeeping system. To relieve some of the resulting burden on the Sec'y Treas. the newsletter paste-up received each quarter from the editor, could be simply turned over to the printer, along with the mailing list, and the collating left up to him. The additional cost of having all this done by the printer could be paid for out of the treasury and would be offset by the Sec'y Treas. having more time to devote to taking care of the sale of books, back issues, and other items which has proved such a welcome source of income for us in the past. With the above in mind members should give these things serious thought and if anyone feels they could take on the job of Sec'y Treas. or Newsletter Editor to make such known at the meeting. Actually the writing up of the newsletter each quarter could be a most interesting and satisfying experience were the editor relieved of all other tasks. In connection with business matters associated with the newsletter your present ed. has kept a day by day account of every transaction and the money involved and each quarter submitted these complete records to the Sec'y Treas. along with a financial report for the quarter. An exact accounting can be made of every transaction and the quarterly financial reports checked against the day by day records. These should be made available for the new ed's use as a reference to check past procedures. Your present ed is sorry he cannot continue in the position but feels that over the past 4 years he has given his best and has established sufficient contacts and procedures to enable other dedicated members of the organization to carry on in a sound financial manner. He will be happy to meet with anyone accepting the position and assist him in getting under way as smoothly as possible. The selection of the new editor is quite urgent in that the October newsletter, being the last issue of 1977, should carry the new editor's name and address and the Jan. 1978 issue should be a product of the new editor.

On the matter of selecting the host of next year's meet or convention and the tentative date members are reminded once more that our not-for-profit organization is not able to finance these meets from the organization's treasury and that the club that hosts them is expected to take care of all the financing, INSURANCE, and related expenses. Insurance is mentioned in caps because your ed. as a Director, and the sole incorporator of the U-S-A Inc. would be remiss if he did not bring to your attention the present climate in regard to liability suits. The size of current court settlements in such cases makes it almost imperative that a club conducting such an activity be a corporation (to limit liability of members). Either that or they must take out insurance for the occasion - if such can be obtained. Some of us including your ed. have had first hand experience with having a liability suit brought against them. As unicyclists we feel the sport is fairly safe but insurance companies view it otherwise. Unicycling and other forms of circus arts are very suspect to them as noted on page 4 of this issue in connection with shutting down of Circus World young people's school in Baraboo. At the annual meeting Aug 21 it would be well for all of us to consider the future of the U-S-A Inc. rather than our own immediate interests. In the event many controversial questions come up as to how and where a '78 meet should be held perhaps a Convention next year rather than a meet will be the answer. Please dig out pg 22 of your Oct 1976 newsletter and reread it.


