

FEATURED GROUP - The "GREAT BRITTONS"

(Ed. note: Five unicycle clubs have been featured during the past year; each was chosen because of its somewhat unique organization. The following is a letter from KEN BRITTON in response to your ed.'s request for information on his unicycling activities.)

"The GREAT BRITTONS is not a formally organized club. I have taught about a dozen people to ride the unicicle and have three regular riders who participate with me in parades. Our biggest parade is the annual Sauerkraut Parade in Phelps, N.Y., the sauerkraut capital of the world. Robert (see picture pg. 1) always rides his 6-foot giraffe. We ride informally as they give us 100 foot of space in the parade which lasts a full hour. One of my best riders spent the summer as an exchange high school student in Europe. Others will not practice enough to be able to ride in parades. I teach anyone who wants to learn (at the Y.M.C.A.) just for the fun of it. There are a few boys who ride whom I haven't been able to contact so far. People seem to be too busy to practice on any formal basis. and I don't have time during the summer.

"How did I learn to ride? About 20 years ago I built a unicycle using the front fork and wheel of a tricycle. The bearings were too loose and I didn't know how to get started, so I quit in two weeks.

"Four years ago at age 60 I bought a 20-inch Schwinn and learned to ride by pushing myself along my cellar wall for a while, morning and night, for 5 weeks. I graduated to the Y.M.C.A. gym and shopping centers for practicing.

"I was fortunate enough to find BILL JENACK's address in a bicycle and unicycle buyer's guide at the library. I contacted Bill, who graciously instructed me in the proper way to mount the unicycle and how to ride one footed. I drove 350 miles to his home and stayed a couple of days. I met BARRY LAPPY and his folks, who were in New York City for a month while Barry performed at Madison Square Garden. RAY LAPPY gave me some good tips on riding. The following year Barry and his folks came to Rochester for a week and they stayed with us in Canandaigua (commuted to Rochester daily). I picked up 3 riders when Dr. BRONDUM's wife, LYNNE, saw Barry and me practicing at the Y.M.C.A. I taught her sons JACQUE, age 11, and J.J., age 10, to ride in one week and mount in two weeks. I cut down a frame and put 4-inch pedal cranks on for ANGELA, age 6, as she was so short. We all put on a show at the Y's "Open House!"

"I have built and sold several 6-foot giraffes at the National Meets.

"I bought a special unicycle hub, bearings and bearing mounts in Florida. I replaced the 14-hole flanges with 18-hole flanges from a 10-speed bike wheel which were heli-arc welded to the unicycle hub. This made it possible to spoke up a 27-inch wheel. (27-inch wheels are not made for 28 spokes.) So now I have a 27-inch unicycle which is not available commercially. I would be glad to help anyone interested in making a giraffe.

"I practice regularly and can rock in place, ride my regular unicycle or 5½ foot giraffe backwards, in circles or figure 8's. I ride the regular unicycle with one foot. I will share my learning of the one foot or backward riding with anyone interested.

"Also, besides a garden and dwarf fruit trees and a big place to keep mowed, I am a jogger. I have run 12,650 miles in the last 10 years, which is over half way around the world.

"I also have three antique cars."

The frame is made up of sections of Raleigh racing bike frames, which are much stronger than regular bike frames. The fork is made of solid spring steel (It came from an older bike). The new forks are made of tubing which is much weaker. It took four regular bike chains with only about 5 inches left over. The seat post and seat are standard Schwinn unicycle components. The wheel is a 36 spoke 20-inch wheel.

"Kunstradfahren." "When doing a catwalk on a circus-bicycle, you will find it much easier if only one had is on the handlebar at a time. I was allowed to try to drive one of their circus-bikes on the rear wheel. It was close to impossible until the instructor told me to use one hand only. In doing so, my weight was more evenly distributed on the bike, and I drove from one corner of the gym to the other on my first try.

*Note to giraffe riders:

By going to a MAG WHEEL and using a keyed sprocket on their popular PENGUIN GIRAFFE, CYCLE COMPONENTS, P. O. Box 4667, El Mont CA 91731, has eliminated the problem all previous commercial giraffe manufacturers experienced with slipping sprockets. The new Magnesium eel gives the giraffe a neat, up-to-date look and at the same time eliminates spoke and crooked wheel problems. The new model is expected to make it debut at the International Cycle Show in N.Y.C. in February, 1979.

*One of our members EMMETT CARPENTER, who with his wife BETTIE run Hamilton's Bicycles East, 1622 South Parkwood, Wichita, Kansas 67218, reports that he has just shipped six unicycles and two custom-built circus bikes to a customer in Amsterdam, Holland. Hamilton's Bicycles East in one of the few old-time bicycle shops left in the United States where one can have custom-build cycles made. The April, 1977, NSLR carried an interesting story on Emmett and Bettie and Hamilton's Bicycles East.

*For the past few years NASSAU COMMUNITY COLLEGE, Garden City, N.Y. has offered a Circus Arts Course in which Unicycling, taught by JOHN JENACK, has proven very popular. With the completion of their new Physical Education Complex, the college now has the most beautiful facilities ever, On Dec. 15, 1978, to call attention to their aquatics program, the public was invited to their First Annual Intramural Splash Contest. BOOK REVIEW:

"ACROBATICS BOOK"
Jack Wiley

Jack Wiley, author of THE UNICYCLE BOWN, BASIC CIRCUS SKILLS and THE TUMBLING BOOK, has just completed a book on the international sport of acrobatics. This is the first comprehensive manual on this sport. The book begins at the most basic level and with completely illustrated material gradually progresses to more advanced stunts. The text explains and diagrams routines for individuals, partners and groups.

Designed not only for the acrobatic performer, the book is also extremely useful for cheerleaders, coaches, judges, or spectators who wish to learn more about this rapidly growing sport.

This most recent book of Jack Wiley's is just off the press. It is a paper-back containing 187 pages and may be ordered from U.S.A., Inc. for \$4.95, postpaid. See the order form on the last page of this NEWSLETTER.

"THE UNICYCLE BOOK"

The outstanding handbook of the sport of Unicycling, which has for years been the one and only source of complete information, is now out of print and no longer available from the publisher Stackpole Books. Word has also been received that the publisher doen not plan to reprint. Fortunately the USA Inc. purchased several hundred copies for resale a few years ago and still has some in stock. 

Regional meets require a lot of hard work for the organizing club; but, ask any club who has held one, there are so many rewards that next year's meet is usually being discussed before the last unicyclist has packed up his equipment and left for home.

The first regional meet of 1978 (that your editor is aware of - if your club has held a meet but no one has written an article about it for the NSLR, please write it yourself and send it in!) was sponsored by the SMILING FACES 4-H UNICYCLE CLUB. It was held on April 29 at the Hancock Recreation Center, a huge facility with ample space for the over 130 riders who attended. At this meet there were ten unicyclists honored for their skill on the wheel, boys and girls in each of five age brackets. To be so honored, a rider had to be the top point winner in his/her age bracket. Points were awarded for the racing and trick-riding winners.

Another regional meet was held on Sept. 30 at the Wonderland Shopping Center in Livonia. Michigan. This event (billed as the "second annual") was sponsored by the REDFORD TOWNSHIP UNICYCLE CLUB, INC. While the meet was almost totally rained out in the afternoon, the over 80 unicyclists spent the wet time in the Centers Community Room singing and being entertained by impromptu demonstrations. A feature of the meet was a "walk the wheel" race, which was a surprise to all - including the hosting club. The obstacle course was like none seen at the N.U.M. It was a "fun" course similar to one designed by CATHY FOX and pictured on page 18 of the October, 1976, NSLR. (This type of course had been the hallmark of the PONTIAC UNICYCLE CLUB's Fall Round-Up, a regional meet which they organized for six years.)

The JAPAN UNICYCLING CLUB decided to join the fun by holding "The Pirst Japan Unicycling Meet" on November 12, 1978. The Club's President, JACK HALPERN, wrote the following

description of this event;

"The First Japan Unicycling Meet attracted an avalance of reporters and camaramen. The purpose of the meet was to promote the sport of unicycling in Japan and show to unicyclists the many riding techniques, unicycling games and some of the unusual unicycles introduced in Jack Wiley's book and in the U.S.A., Inc. NSLR.

"After an opening speech in which I explained the merits of the sport, etc., there was a unicycling demonstration in which TAKESHI YAMAMOTO, a professional trick rider did such trick as skipping rope on his uni. I rode Japan's first and only three-wheeled uni (built by Yamamoto), and club children demonstrated their skill in riding a handle-bar unit with pedals. There were also several giraffes at the meet, and the audience was impressed at how the giraffe could be mounted in the open while it is in motion. (Jack is planning on writing an article about giraffe free-mounting techniques for a future NSLR.)

"After the demonstration there were races of several kinds followed by verious unicycling games such as tag and catch ball.

"Takeshi Yamanoto then announced the formation of the "All-Japan Unicycling Federation," headed by unicycling veteran YOSHITO SUZUKI. (Everyone was amazed to see him riding the uni at the age of 86.) The "Federation," which only exists on paper, is supposed to unite the several unicycling clubs in Japan.

"This was followed by testing the skills of all the participants, and everyone received a certificate indicating his level of skill (divided into six grades).

"The most important result of this meet was the attention it received from the media. Some of the leading magazines in Japan published many photos and articles." (The picture below is one of many that appeared with an article in the MAINICHI GRAPH. That is 86-year-old YOSHITO SUZUKI in plaid coat.)

What does a young man who has ridden a 43" unicycle around the world do for an encore? Wally's problem is not determining what, but ther which of the many exciting ideas he is constantly considering.

He also finds the concept of man-powered flight fascinating and . . . and . . . and . . . There is no limit to his imagination, and seemingly no end to his energy.

While U.S.A., Inc. members have followed Wally's trip in considerable detail with each NSIR and are aware that his unicycle had a hard-rubber tire, that it took 53 welds to complete the trip and that he recuperated from his broken arm on a house boat in Kashmir, India; not too ruch has been said about Wally as a person. So he following lines might be called, "Meet Wally Watts."

When Wally arrived at the home of your editor, he was heading toward a suburb of Chicago (He couldn't remember exactly what the name was and his address book had accidently been packed up and sent to his home.) to spend an evening with a family he had met on his trip east who had invited him to their home. (He couldn't rememtheir name either.) But Wally was heading west with the assurance that everything would work out fine, and thanks to RICH ILLING of Downers Grove, Illinois, it did. Rich had sent your editor an article on Wally's unicycle trip through the Chicago area and in it were the name and hometown of the family with whom Wally was to stay. Luck? Of course. But when someone looks for success rather than failure, doesn't he create his own good luck?

In addition to his positive attitude, Wally has observed much in his travels that have lead to a few quotes that could be called "Wise words from Wally Watts:"

In a newspaper article that appeared in SALLY WHITE's paper in Pennsylvania, Wally was uoted as saying, "Just believe what you believe in and don't try to push it on anybody else. Be what you want to be. But remember, your way isn't the only way." After seeing the world

Members of U.S.A., Inc. will be saddened to learn of the death of FATHER JAMES J.
MORAN, Founding Member of the Unicycling Society of America, Inc. and founder of St. Helen's Unicycle Drill Team, Newbury, Ohio. Father Moran's fine group won accolades wherever they performed throughout the United States and were often mentioned in the NEWSLETTER over the years. Even though Father Moran was retired and in failing health, his interest in the Unicycle Drill Team never waned. His last contribution to the U.S.A., Inc. NEWSLETTER is found in the October, 1978, issue.

*SCOTT KELLY and BRYCE JACOBSON both wrote asking specific questions about events in the National Unicycle Meet. JAN LAYNE, director of the Smiling Faces 4-H Unicycle Club who will be hosting the 1979 N.U.M., is currently working out all of the details of this event. These will be published in the April NSLR. General information is available elsewhere in this issue under National Unicycle Meet Information.

One question that both writers asked about was, "What is the slow race?" This is a race that definitely "separates the men from the boys (women from the girls)" in unicycle riding. The rider must maintain forward motion at all times (there can be no rocking or zig-zag motion). The object is to be the last to cross the finish line. The rider, of course, must maintain his balance on the wheel throughout the race.

*ANN THERESE FERGUSON recently joined the U.S.A., Inc. along with her four brothers (MIKE, JIM, FRANK and EDDIE) and her sister (MARIA). Ann wrote that all six Fergusons ride very well. While the family's home is in Trafford, PA, Ann is currently a student at Duquesne University. She wrote the following information about herself, "I rode my unicycle for 'carnival,' a big event we have each year. I was dressed as a clown as I rode. I always ride on campus when the weather is permitting. Also, I ride a six-foot unicycle; I received it as a graduation present from high school."

It is placed on the ground after being lit so the air in the bag can heat up while being held, filling the bag with hot air. Then there is a crucial pause to ensure lifting power. The bag is launched by letting go. On a calm night it should rise straight up 200-300 feet. The effect is magnificent and launching 2 or 3 is even better. light wind, they will trail each other like geese. From the ground each one looks like an eerie light in the sky." (Matthew continues to say that this should not be attempted unless there is plenty of open space. The balloon could get caught and cause a fire. Also included in this letter was a detailed account of Halloween at the Brigdon home. 


