SKILL LEVELS - What are they? How do you learn about them? Where can you be tested?

others had a vision to challenge unicycle riders to expand their riding abilities. With input from other riders she developed four levels and ordered patches and corresponding cards. [see: NEWSLETTER (forerunner of ON ONE WHEEL) Winter, 1980, pp. 11-12]

These small chevrons were designed to be worn immediately beneath the round U.S.A. patch. A green "rider" patch was created for the unicyclist who was content to be able to ride unaided - one who might never strive to selfmount or "dismount with control." It was never designed to be one in the series of patches.

As Jan had anticipated, the original four levels were changed somewhat and increased to the current ten. Articles in OOW chronicle the evolution. In 1987, SEM ABRAHAMS developed a list of skills in order of difficulty based on his own experience and that of other riders. At the Annual U.S.A. Meeting, he was asked to put this list into ten divisions. This he did the current list of Achievement Skill vels was born. Anyone wishing a copy of these and/or the list of ten different mounts should send a self-addressed, stamped envelope with the request to the USA P.O. Box.

As riders became serious about achieving higher levels, it was apparent that a video would be of great help. So at the 1989 NUM SEM and TERESA ABRAHAMS began filming material for what is now "THE I.U.F. ACHIEVEMENT SKILL LEVELS DEMONSTRATED" video. (See order form -inside back cover of each issue of OOW)

While most established unicycle clubs have a designated person who is qualified to test the advanced levels, individuals or new clubs are not so fortunate. Therefore, at the 1992 Annual USA Meeting the following plan was developed for Levels 5 and over:

*Testing must be done by a qualified and designated person who will then award the appropriate chevron and card.

*Riders can be tested at all future NUM's.

*Riders may mail video tape to:

NATIONAL UNICYCLE MEET み

JULY 30-31 & AUGUST 1 1993



Adrian College in Adrian, Michigan will be the site of the 1993 National Unicycle Meet sponsored by the REDFORD TOWNSHIP UNICYCLE CLUB. Because of the large number of riders anticipated, the first competitive race will begin on Friday afternoon. The Annual U.S.A. Meeting will be held on Friday evening. All remaining races will take place on Saturday (weather permitting) as well as Standard Class and Parade Competition. The "Public Show" and workshops will end the day. All remaining competitive events will conclude on Sunday evening with a final awards presentation.

There are a number of campgrounds near Adrian and several motels in town. However, since all events are planned on campus, it is hoped that riders and their families will take advantage of facilities on campus for camping, housing, and dining. The next issue of ON ONE WHEEL will include a 1993 NUM Registration Form.

National Unicycle Meets have so much to offer! One of the most exciting things is the people who attend. And so, in case you haven't already . . .

I'D LIKE YOU TO MEET . . .

BOB GRAHAM, a Director of G.U.T.S., the unicycle club of Geneseo, IL. Bob, who is an advocate of HALFED (That stands for "Have a Little Fun Every Day"), certainly lives by his creed! The only problem with talking to him is that you miss some of what he is saying — what with your laughter and the guffaws of others listening in on the conversation.

However, in a serious vein, Bob offered this advice to artistic riding competitors: "Help your audience." When working on your routine, break it into pieces - beginning, ending and all the good stuff in the middle. And when you finish one of the pieces, give the audience a clue by pausing briefly with eye contact and hand and arm motions. The audience is anxious to clap and show support. The rider must encourage this by showing the crowd when applause is appropriate - and that should not be only at the end of the routine!

ROGER ANTTILA, one of the many tireless workers at the 1992 NUM. Roger's patient and clear directions for each unicycle race contributed greatly to the calm, orderly way the events took place. Accolades to a great team!

EVELYN SANDER, who "came in first on everything I practiced." Is there a message in that statement?

DUSTIN KELM, a USA Director whose article had just appeared in Billy Graham's DECISION magazine. As USA Director, Dustin is interested in any suggestions you may have concerning the NUM rules or the Achievement Levels. When writing to him (you can use the USA P.O. Box), tell him what you feel should be changed - and how. He will not respond to you individually but will take into consideration all suggestions made to him.

TERI AHLSTRAND, whose name appears on the list of "Meet Records" for both the 1991 and 1992 NUM's. Teri's story is both impressive and unique. While she is not new to unicycling, this was only her second NUM. She began to unicycle as a toddler 30 years ago when her Dad created a tiny unicycle for her from an old tricycle. This was in Embarrass, MN, a little town that does not even appear in your Editor's atlas. She "furthered her unicycling career" by participating in each 4th of July

parade, where the participation fee just about paid for her costume. This year this Level 4 rider attended with her baby boy, JOSIAH, born just 5 weeks and 2 days before the NUM. At 8 lbs., 13 oz. Josiah almost equaled the size of his petite young mother.

CONSTANCE COTTER, who once again took top honors for Couples Artistic Riding. In 1991 she and her partner LEE HARTSON created a memorable dance routine. This year, with JOHN FOSS, the routine gave the audience the impression it was witnessing the unfolding of a beautiful love story.

LISA POLINORI, who electrified the audience with her choreography and lip synchronization (see cover photo). This was Lisa's first NUM. What did she find most enjoyable? Meeting the people she'd been reading about in our publications and seeing all the tricks. Lisa is no stranger to the unicycle; anyone who watched her ride will agree with that! She never owned a bicycle while growing up in Alliance, OH. Her means of transportation was her unicycle. A year ago she began taking a dance class and is now putting together dance movements with unicycle riding for aerobic exercise. Lisa's "aerobic exercise" is truly an art form and residents of Washington, D.C., where she now resides, are in for a treat if they see her practicing with other unicycli in the area.

ROXANNE SLADEK, the "30 Something" rider who shepherds the HUTCHINSON ONE WHEELERS. Her concern for each rider in the Club is very apparent. Certainly it was not by chance that "Sound of Music" was used for the Club routine. In kelly green pinafores and lederhosen the members appeared to enjoy riding as much as the original von Trapp children enjoyed singing. Racers received detailed instructions before each race (below) so that event after event moved along smoothly with well-informed contestants.









Those GRANBERRY's (M) will jump rope on almost anything! Here GLEN used a rope, strung in the center with plastic sheathing for a firmer arc, as he jumps (below) on a 2-wheel uni and (above) on an ultimate wheel. No, there are no toe clips on the ultimate. Having toes "captured" could lead to serious injury! Control comes from placing one foot on top of one pedal. On the other side of the wheel, the foot is be dedunder the pedal. Lots of leg power and practice will result in an "ultimate" jump.










A new artistic riding competition category in 1992 was "Group Freestyle." The Rules Committee members created this category to challenge upper-level riders, since each Club could enter one "Group." This resulted in choreography not possible when Clubs work with riders of all abilities. It also provided a category for Clubs with few members attending such as the <--REDFORD TWP. UNICYCLE CLUB, family units such as the MESSAMERS (1-r KAREN, Dr. NICK and daughter GINA) as well as a challenge to Clubs who entered this category. Clubs can now challenge riders to improve their riding skills by offering membership in a "Group" only open to those who have passed a designated Achievement Level.



Correction: CHARLOTTE FOX ROGERS pointed out that, while Ron Plath has done all of the recent art work for TOM MILLER, the original "mad unicyclist" logo used by THE UNICYCLE FACTORY as well as GUTS (Geneseo [IL] Unicycle Team Spinners) was created in 1984 by Mike Kazaleh.

Again the unicycle has surfaced illustrating a national economic concept. The Oct. 21, 1992 issue of THE DETROIT NEWS contained a drawing of 5 suited giraffe riders holding together in a circle while other giraffe unicyclsts attempted to join the circle or left in defeat. 
Like in many good movies, the credits come first. Nathalie Noël and Normand Beaumont were the principal organizers. both are only in their early 20's. I first met Normand in 1985, at the International Cycling Festival in Hull, Quebec. He was a *little* skinny kid, playing basketball with his older brothers, on the Québec team.

There was much organizational help for UNICON VI. Laval University supplied funds, labor and skills to promote the event. Their marketing department advertised, contacted the press, and distributed UNICON posters all over the city. The Athletic departments provided skilled help in organizing and running the track events. Among many sponsors, Miyata/Oxford of Canada donated \$3000.00










to pay for printing of T-shirts, and for the privilege of being the exclusive unicycle sponsor. Special purple shirts, different from the ones given to the athletes, were worn by UNICON officials. They will be major collectors' items in the years to come! The final budget for UNICON VI was approximately \$83,100.00 Canadian.

The entire Beaumont family was involved. Their basement was turned into an office, filled with computer, copy machine, phones, and stacks of paperwork when I saw it. Thanks also to all of the people, whose names I don't even know, who made UNICON VI such a success!

Part of that success may have been due to the relatively small turnout at UNICON V last year in Hull. Because that convention was finalized without sufficient advance notice, many riders, who would have attended, decided to wait until 1992 and Québec.

Twelve countries were represented, beating the previous record of eleven from UNICON II in Tokyo in 1987. They were Canada, Dominican Republic*, England, France*, Germany, Hong Kong*, Holland, Israel, Japan, New Zealand*, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. The stars represent countries attending UNICON for the first time.

Though there were 851 riders at UNICON II in 1987, most of them were there for the All Japan Unicycle Meet, which there had a start of the All Japan Unicycle Meet.

Though there were 851 riders at UNICON II in 1987, most of them were there for the All Japan Unicycle Meet, which was held together with it. This makes UNICON II, with 206 registered riders, the largest truly international UNICON gathering. In addition, there were many delegation members who were not competitors. The incredible Japan team had 100 people, and 72 riders!

Official events started on the morning of Aug. 4, with speeches by hosts Nathalie Noël and Normand Beaumont, IUF President Jack Halpern, and others. The skies over the track were heavy and gray, and there was a light mist in the air. As racing events got to a start, the mist turned to light rain. Though there was an indoor track at Laval, there was a volleyball clinic going on in there, which had dibs. We hoped the rain would stop!

By the time everyone was soaked, the indoor track finally became available and in we went! In racing, the Japanese riders dominated the track. Not just because more than a third of the competitors were from Japan, but because they brought with them some incredibly fast riders. Unicycle racing is much larger in Japan than anywhere else, with 20-30 major unicycle meets there every year. Many new speed records were set, which you can read about at the end of this article.

It rained all through the night. Racing began indoors the next day, but by lunch, the rain had stopped, the pink rubber track was drying off, and the sky was clearing, so we went back outside and set some records!

At this point I'll mention the camera crew. ABC TV produces a show called *Amazing Games*, which is shown on the ESPN channel. This show features unusual sports, and usually takes them fairly seriously. They spent most of a week in Québec, working on a segment for their

show, using the Beaumont family as its focus. Unfortunately, they were unable to stick around for any of the artistic events! The show is scheduled to be broadcast in early 1994. We'll keep you informed.

There were many notable performances on the track. One that was most memorable to me was having my winning streak broken in the walk the wheel race. I had never been beaten in this race (aside from falling off at the finish line in Mobile in '89) since my very first entry in 1981. In 1992, this was one of the few events I'd trained for, and entered. In my heat, I came in first with a time of 9.7 sec; not enough to beat my old record.

Yuichiro Kato, in the next heat, went flying down the track, and about two thirds of the way down, it looked like he was going to loose it. You can tell this is about to happen when you see a rider start going too fast and loosing his balance. But he didn't. With arms flailing, and feet barely staying with it, he crossed the finish line in a position that could be described as "out of control coasting!" If the distance was 31 or 32 meters, he probably would not have made it. Despite being "out of control," he met the race criteria for "riding across the finish line." Kato brought the old record of 8.95 to a new 8.0 sec. But, as his competitor, I can only say, in good nature, "If we were in the same heat, it would have been different!" Yeah. Right.

The fastest riders enter in the EXPERT category. The only problem with this group is that you don't know how old the riders are. The record setting EXPERTS ranged in age from 13 to 17, except for (little) old me, who is 30. Other record setters were Abby Cernkovich, 10, Carrie Norris, 11, and Dale Granberry, 18, all Americans.

This was the first time unicycle racing had been done on a large scale with French as the working language. Due to the language barrier (between French-speaking people and experienced racing people) and the fact that most officials were having their first experience with unicycle competition, there were many errors in the documentation of the race results. Many of these errors were later corrected, but some still linger. Problems like these we must sometimes attribute to the newness of our sport. for best results, the organizers should have held a small unicycle meet prior to UNICON.

Later that day was the "International Evening of Unicycling" in Québec. This was a show, presented free to the public, in Carré d'Youville, an open square just outside the city wall surrounding Old Québec. Bleachers and basketball nets were erected specially for this occasion. Two riders each from 5 countries were invited to be a part of this show. They were Mitsuru Harada and Yuichiro Kato from Japan, Alice Nicolas and Ursula Morineau from France, Anthony Hernandez and Javier Ruíz from Puerto Rico, and Ken Fuchs and John Foss from the U.S.A. We were joined by Eric Dumont and another Canadian performer. The organizer was Pierre Bernier, an entertainer, with some of his fellow performers.

We were divided up into two uni. basketball teams, with one rider from each country on each team. It was an international basketball game for fun, with comedy bits added to make it more of a show. For example, two "tourists," with cameras around their necks and gaudy clothes, wandered into the middle of the game and started taking pictures. We just played around them. Pierre, the referee, on a 9 foot unicycle, blew his whistle and yelled them off the court. Later, the tourists came back as "coaches," giving our teams false and unworkable plays. At one point, Ken Fuchs came out on his two wheeled unicycle to have an advantage sinking baskets. Two "police" came out and took it from him, leaving him with a tiny clown bicycle.

Between sections of the game, we were entertained by artistic bicyclists Nathalie Noël, a beginner, and Normand Beaumont, the Canadian champion. Also, Matthias Schlecht and Michael Bôpple, the current world champions of men's doubles artistic bicycling, performed some of their spectacular skills.

The next morning, we gathered "in the woods" for the UMX (unicycle moto-cross), or Unicross race. The "woods" were conveniently located almost next door to the dorm building. Our race was on a fitness trail "paved" with mushy wood chips, making it a good challenging surface. Some spots along the course were wet and extra mushy. There were a couple of small but very steep hills, and a little bridge with a big bump on it! We were started in an open grassy field, where riders had about 100 meters to go from a super-wide starting line, into the beginning of the trail, which was about 2 meters wide.

The race was run in two heats; 0-18 and 19-UP. Each heat had roughly 100 riders in it! This is a great event because everyone gets to participate together, and it's very visual from a spectator point of view. I also like the UMX event because it shows the general public that unicycles are not as unstable as they appear to be.

After this, it was time to board the 6 school busses to the Plaines d'Abraham, for the gliding and coasting competition. Because these two events can only be entered by a small number of highly skilled riders, they're presented as spectator events. The beautiful area, part of the Parc des Champs de Bataille, provided a great place to just relax, sit back on the grass, and watch. For the riders, the gliding course was challenging due to a couple of bumpy spots in the road as it went down. Only the most solidly skilled "gliders" made it to the finish.

What is "Downhill Gliding?" Think of a downhill

What is "Downhill Gliding?" Think of a downhill ski race. The athletes go down the "mountain" as fast as they can, and are timed. They then wait nervously while the other competitors come down, to see if their times get beaten. The difference here is that the skiers are on one wheel, they aren't allowed to touch their pedals, and they can only control the unicycle by using their foot as a brake against the tire (and also there's no snow)!

Then we moved to the coasting event. The optimum road for the coasting event has a very slight downhill grade; just enough to keep the riders going. This road had that quality, but only for about 150 meters, after which it turned upward. The two farthest reaching coasters finished at the beginning of this uphill section, only *one meter* apart! The two coasting champions were Yuichiro Kato and José Roman.

These two events were combined with a picnic in that same park. It was nice, giving people a chance to relax and socialize for a little while, with no competitive pressure. Little did we know that we would return to the same place a few hours later, where *all* of us would be setting a new world record together!

We were loaded into the busses again, and brought to the waterfront at the bottom of Old Quebec. Here we were to participate in the group ride through the city. I had participated in such rides before, but never with such a large group! The small group rides I'd been in had been fun, and I knew this could only be better.

Tourists stopped in their tracks, their jaws slack, as they saw 200 people on unicycles, from twelve different countries, ride past. This wasn't what they expected to see on their visit to Québec! Actually, maybe they were expecting to see something, because UNICON posters were plastered on kiosks all around the city!

Old Québec is built on a steep hillside. In the old days, horses probably died trying to pull wagons up the road that we rode up. Before we started the uphill section, our leaders yelled for everyone to stop. Once everyone had finally collected together into a reasonably small area, they pointed up to the top of a wall that looked like it was 100 feet above us, and yelled "LOOK!" There, against the early evening sky, was Pierre Bernier riding his unicycle across the top of the wall. At the end, he dismounted, and took a bow to a resounding, international cheer from below! Only the most hardcore riders pedaled the entire upward distance, with the rest walking up the rear.

Eventually we arrived back at the Plaines d'Abraham. We were squashed down into a single-file line to be counted, which created a unicycle traffic jam! Then they spread us all out on the road which was used in the coasting event. We were there for what had been described in our schedules as the "Guinness Record," but most of the people didn't know what it was. It was an attempt to break a record which had been set in May by Sammy Hellwig in Germany, with the world's longest "unicycle chain." In it, 154 unicyclists took turns riding through a special gateway, and were counted.

through a special gateway, and were counted.

The UNICON people were more ambitious. They wanted to get all the people riding at the same time, while holding hands. Had they asked me, I don't think I would have considered it possible. But, 191 riders, some of them total beginners, successfully rode across the width of the road, all while holding hands! To fit it into a single photo, they had a photographer in a revolving restaurant on the top of a hotel over half a kilometer away! This new world record will be submitted to Guinness. There is no previous listing of such a record in the book.

The evening finished off with a gigantic group photo of everyone present (but not spread out over 150 meters). It will be my 1992 Christmas/Holiday card, friends!

For the next issue of UNICYCLING QUARTERLY, I'm saving the story of the 10k Marathon, the closest unicycle basketball tournament in UNICON history, the giant UNICON party, and the best assemblage of artistic competition ever seen. If you were at UNICON VI, I'd love to get some of your impressions, in writing, to use for part II of this article. Everyone shouldn't be limited to hearing about it from my point of view only. We need some fresh points of view! I leave it up to you.

All of the new speed records were set at the UNICON in Québec. If records have been broken outside of North America, your editor has not yet been notified. The times in parenthesis are the previous records.

** This speed broke the previous UNICON record. The official World Record, as listed in the Guinness Book of World Records, is 12.74 by Peter Rosendahl (Sweden), set in Las Vegas. His crank arm length is not known.

UNICYCLE CHAIN: 191 people, all holding hands, rode unicycles simultaneously, beating a record of 154 people set earlier this year in Germany. In the first record, the 154 people did not all ride together holding hands.

STANDARD SKILL ARTISTIC RIDING: Though our system is not perfect, the judging is designed to be *objective*, and therefore consistent from year to year, so scores from different years can be compared. These are the World Record scores for EXPERTS, to date:




