




# UNICYCLING AND "COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT"

On Oct. 20, the unicycle was given some serious consideration as USAm JEANPAUL JENACK addressed the Hofstra University (NY) Chaptel of Phi Delta Kappa. The topic was "Cognitive Development Through Circus Arts", and for the evening the fraternity of educators (PDK) was presented with an intellectual and actual three ring circus.

In the section dealing with unicycling, Jenack stated that "The unicycle is an ideal vehicle for assisting a child in developing his/her concept of body-in-space, a fundamental concept addressed by current wholistic physical education curricula." He later expressed his beliefs that "the degree of specificity as a motor activity and the attention to detail necessary to successfully master the unicycle is at such a high level that a child's cognitive development can be significantly improved and/or accelerated by involvement with the activity.

Jenack concluded his lecture with a demonstration of a variety of unicycling and juggling skills, to the applause of the PDK membership. As a result of the interest generated by the lecture, he as since been asked to appear at a number of schools, as well as at a PDK convention in April of next year.





# THE 1982 NATIONAL UNICYCLE MEET

This year's meet was held on the hot weekend of August 6-8. For the first time in at least five years, there was no rain! IACALESTER COLLEGE in St. Paul proved to be a beautiful setting for the events. The dormitory rooms were only a short walk (ride!) from the gym & track, and many participants did not have to move their cars for the entire weekend.

On Friday the action started with unicyclists checking in and meeting in the large gym. People got acquainted and had a chance to talk and ride together without any pre-scheduled events to interfere. Late in the afternoon, the basketball games were called to order, and the basketball-inclined unicyclists grouped up into informal teams for an hour or two of fun & sweat. The winning team, put together by SEM ABRAHAMS, was called the "Globetrotters" and also included FRANK BIRDSALL, SCOTT BACCUS, HANS & PETER MILLS, and your Ed. for a bit.

Later in the evening the people at the meet were treated to a very special event when JUTTA MILTENBERGER, an artistic bicyclist visiting from Germany, gave a demonstration. She did two programs, the first consisting of figures (tricks) that a beginning artistic cyclist would be able to do, and the second sing all the difficult figures she could do tor competing herself. These, by the way, were some of the most difficult in the book. Aside from the figures shown in pics. 20-22, she also did such things as standing on the saddle (no hands), and all sorts of wheelie figures and spins.

She performed the same two programs on Saturday night, too, to the tune of standing ovations both times. Artistic bicycling is a more developed sport than our type of unicycling, and is super-impressive for unicyclists to watch!

Saturday was another sweat-pouring day of sunshine, with the uni. racers speeding around the big green track. The over-30 mile race was run first, before it got too hot. This was not the case, though, for Mark Schaefer of Redford, who sprinted for four laps and set a new NUM record for the mile (4:33.02), in the middle of the afternoon. During this time, many race spectators sat down under the lip of the huge grandstand, in the only shade available.

Sunday was artistic riding time, and many interesting tricks were demonstrated.

ON ANDERSON from Seattle did an old Kenny Woods (WOODS & LARSON) trick; Sideways Wheel Walk. He placed most of his weight on the saddle through his hands, and skipped along CONTINUED ON PAGE 7














20-21-22. JUTTA MILTENBERGER, from Germany, on her artistic bicycle:

the top of the wheel with a foot on either side of the frame. MARK SCHAEFER did his backward wheel walk with feet behind the frame, using his toes to push the back part of the wheel (see pic. in Wint.'82 nslr). DANIEL DUMENG, the unicycle speedster from Puerto Rico, brought with him a mount that nearly everybody tried at least once. The KICK-UP mount, with the uni. laying on the floor starts by standing on the top pedal/crank with one foot, and use the other foot to kick the seat up so that it hits the other leg. Kicking foot goes to other pedal, and rides off!

There were 142 registered riders at the meet, including the 10 from Japan, DANIEL DUMENG from Puerto Rico who came this year all by himself, and SEM ABRAHAMS and his father CARLHO from Holland. Also JUTTA MILTENBERGER from Germany (all artistic bicyclists can ride unicycles). These people deserve credit for the long long trips they made for the sake of unicycling!

Most of the people stayed Sunday night because they had long drives ahead of them. Your Ed. probably feels like many other members in that he regrets that he didn't see any more of the Twin Cities area than Macalester College and the freeway, but there will be future opportunities for us all, I'm sure! Someday, we will have a National Unicycle Meet all the way out on the west coast!











































#### 1982 NATIONAL UNICYCLE MEET RESULTS

#### 1982 USA inc. ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The greater part of this year's meeting involved discussion of the newly-presented constitution proposal. After a few details were agreed upon, the Constitution has since been included in the Spring, 1982 Newsletter for membership vote. There were approx. 117 votes of yes, and 25 no votes at the time the ballots were counted, so now this document is in effect. If you want to know what this means, it is a very interesting ocument to read, and not at all confusing.

This year there were two volunteers to hold next years meet. JAN LAYNE also offered to host the meet in '83, but since Ken had been voted in as president, he decided he would do it himself. As of now, he is looking

at Syracuse, New York, as the site. More about this elsewhere in this issue, but the fact that there were two different volunteers makes it sound as though this may be a very special meet indeed. Also the fact that Ken is an individual member rather than a club points to this meet being different!

Here are some numbers taken from the annual Directors Report of July 26, 1982:

Present inventory of books- \$2993.95 Pins, charms, patches - \$1024.60

Newsletters - \$6207.50


Total retail value \$10226.05

These are unsold items that are stockpiled, waiting for members to buy them.

From Janury 1, to July 15, 1982 we took in \$1167.60 and disbursed \$1190.62, thus leaving us with a total balance at that time of \$794.80. (Note: since January we have disbursed \$23.02 more than we received.) Paidup subscriptions to the newsletter went from 377 to 331. The number at this time is somewhere in between, but is still a disappiontingly small number. Since there are about 100,000 unicycle riders in this country, it is safe to assume that at least one percent of them would join our society, IF THEY KNEW ABOUT IT. That is 1000 potential members.

Your new officers for 1983 would at this time like to announce a giant membership drive for 1983 and beyond. We believe that it should be no problem for each of you members out there to go out and find at least one person that would like to join our society and help to promote unicycling. This includes family members, too, so if you are part of a family of five members, you should be able to find at least five new members for your family. Your Ed. knows that there are thousands of people out there that ride unicycles, and would like to know more about unicycling and find other unicyclists, and there are others who are just as eager, but

These numbers represent the approximate number of paid-up <u>full</u> memberships (newsletter subscriptions) for the state or country indicated. Since the family members are attached to the full members and are concentrated mostly in the "National Meet Area" of Indiana, Minnesota, Michigan & Ohio, they have been left out because they don't represent the capital that allows us to better promote the sport of unicycling, but <u>do</u> show strong interest!

















#### 1982 REDFORD MINI-MEET




