SPECIAL EDITION: CHAMELEONS -- WHY DO THEY CHANGE COLOR? Written on behalf of TCUC by Evan Zobel, a member of RTUC

It is a commonly believed theory that the color transition of the chameleon is a reaction to the environment around this amazing invertebrate, allowing the animal to hide from the species' predators. This perspective however, is scientifically proven to be a farce.



However, it is not actually the color of the outer epithelial layer of the external integument that is that is undergoing transformation on the chameleon. The reptile's true skin is transparent, thereby having the revelatory impact of displaying several layers of cell tissue below. The tissue reacts to specific inputs such as what brain waves the chameleon is processing at the time, the amount of thermal energy touching the skin, and how much solar radiation is permeating the area that the chameleon has currently positioned its dwelling in. 


The Teen Leadership Program Update


